Five Winston - Salem high school track stars intend to enroll at Wake Forest next fall.

The five join eight other Twin Citians who have taken part in either freshman or varsity Deacon track to give Coach Bill Jordan almost enough to field

a Winston-Salem team.

Hugh Hampton of West Forsyth is a high jump champion, Hampton wasn't able to get going this year but holds the Forsyth 3-A Conference high jumprecord, Hampton has been ac-

cepted at Wake Forest.

Bill Raisner, who ran the 440 and the relay at North Forsyth, will also join the Deacons. North's mile relay team won the Forsyth 3-A title this season in record setting time of 3:36. Raisner finished second in the 440 in the conference meet and fourth in the district. He has also been accepted at Wake Forest.

Johnny Stewart of West Forsyth is a versatile track man. He won the 1965 decathlon, edging Roland Barnhardt of Reynolds, and hopes to enroll at Wake Forest.

Stewart is the Forsyth 3-A Conference 440 champion and record holder with a :52.5. He was second in the district. He also is high hurdles conference champion and was third in this event in the district.

Stuart Peters of Reynolds is another versatile young man. Peters won both the high and low hurdles in the Central 4-A meet. His low hurdles time of :21.1 broke the conference record.

Peters was second in both the high jump and the broad jump in the conference meet.

Peters was second in the high hurdles in the state meet, the only Winston - Salem entrant to place.

Ron Clitherow, a miler from Reynolds, is the fifth Winston-Salem boy. Clitherow was second in the mile run in the district meet and was a consistent winner all year. He also runs the 880.
