

# Reynolds Is Co-Favorite in Track Meet

Apr. 29, 65

Reynolds and Burlington Williams will be co-favorites in the Central 4-A Conference track meet to be held at Hanes Park Friday.

Time trials in the dashes and hurdles will be held Friday morning, starting at 10:30. Field events will start at 2:30 in the afternoon with the track finals at 3:30 p.m.

Indications are that overall times and distances should be better this year than last.

Stuart Peters of Reynolds should be one of the standouts. Peters, who has led the Demons track team this year, is favored in the high hurdles, low hurdles and is a top contender in the high jump.

Peters has had a :15.4 in the highs, with Joe Howard of Greensboro Grimsley also having a :15.4. Clay Rumble of Page has a :15.9. The winning time last year was :16.2. Peters was third in the high and low hurdles last year.

In the low hurdles, Peters has a :20.6 with Howard as his nearest challenger with a :21.2. The winning time last year was :21.9.

Chip Chandler of Greensboro Grimsley has done 5-9 in the high jump, which makes him the favorite. Peters and Howard (of Grimsley) have done 5-8. The winning jump last year was 5-8. Peters was third last year.

Roland Barnhardt of Reynolds is the favorite in the broad jump with a mark of 20 feet, 6 inches as his best. Steve Cirba of Page has done 19 feet, 7 inches and Chester Harris of High Point has hit 19 feet, 6 inches. The winning jump last year was 19 feet, 8 inches. Barnhardt was second last year.

Mike Garrison of Burlington Williams is the favorite in the 100-yard dash with a time of 10 seconds. Mike Harrison of Salisbury Boyden has done :10.1. Last year's winning time was :10.6.

Harrison of Salisbury is the man to beat in the 220 with a :22. Garrison of Burlington has a :22.1. The winning time last year in the 220 was :24.

Mike Julian of Salisbury Boyden is the favorite in the mile with a 4:40.7. Ronnie Johnson of Salisbury has a 4:41.7 and Randy Phillips of Reynolds has

a 4:42. The winning time last year was 4:42.6.

Paul Kinley of High Point is the top man in the 440 with a :53.3. His top challengers are Eddie Hicklin of Burlington and Rod Kivett of Page with :54. The winning time last year was :53.6.

Bob Albright of Greensboro Grimsley is the favorite in the 880 with a 2:02.8. Ron Clitherow of Reynolds with a 2:04 and Charles Wagner of Salisbury Boyden with 2:05 are top challengers. The winning time last year was 2:04.5.

Burlington Williams will be favored in the 880 relay with a time of 1:35.2. Greensboro Grimsley should be a strong challenger with 1:35.3. The winning time last year was a record-setting 1:34.7.

Greensboro Page is the mile relay favorite with a 3:38.7. Grimsley is second with a 3:39. The winning time last year was 3:39.5.

John Hooper of Burlington leads the field in the shot with 50 feet, 9½ inches. His main challenger is Tom Roos of Greensboro Grimsley with a throw of

49 feet, 3 inches. The winner last year hit 49 feet.

Tommy Wrenn of Burlington is picked to win the discus, with a best throw of 136 feet, 6 inches. Johnny Johnson of Reynolds has done 134 feet, 8 inches. The winning throw last year was 140 feet, 10¼ inches.

Clay Rumble of Page leads the pole vaulters with 11 feet, 6 inches. Fred Allen of Grimsley and Tom Barbee of Reynolds have done 11 feet. The winning vault last year was 12 feet.

# Reynolds Favored To Win 4-A Track

Four Class 4-A Central Conference records could fall in the conference track meet today at Hanes Park Friday. Winston-Salem Reynolds is host and defending champion.

Time trials in the dash events and the high and low hurdles begin at 10:30 a.m. Finals in the field events start at 2:30 p.m. and finals in the track events begin at 3:30.

For the past few years the meet has been held at night in Greensboro Senior High Stadium.

The record in the 220-yard dash is one of the most likely to fall. The conference mark is :22.8. Both Mike Garrison of Burlington Williams (:22.1) and Mike Harrison of Salisbury Boyden (:22) have bettered that.

Stuart Peters of Reynolds could break the 180-yard low hurdles record. Peters has a :20.6 in the low hurdles; the conference mark is :21.1.

Bob Albright of Greensboro Grimsley has a good chance at the record in the 880-yard run. The record is 2:03 and Albright has done 2:02.8.

Mike Garrison and Mike Harrison have matched the record (:10.0) in the 100-yard dash.

Burlington's 880-yard team has a 1:35.2 timing and the conference mark is 1:34.7.

Greensboro Grimsley has a 1:35.3.

Most of the other conference marks appear safe unless some of the track men do a lot better than they have been doing.

In the high hurdles, the record is :15. Stuart Peters of Reynolds and Joe Howard of Grimsley have the best times (:15.4).

The mile record is 4:36. Mike

Julian of Salisbury Boyden has a 4:40.7.

The 440-yard dash record is :52.3. Paul Kinley of High Point is the top man in this event with a :53.3.

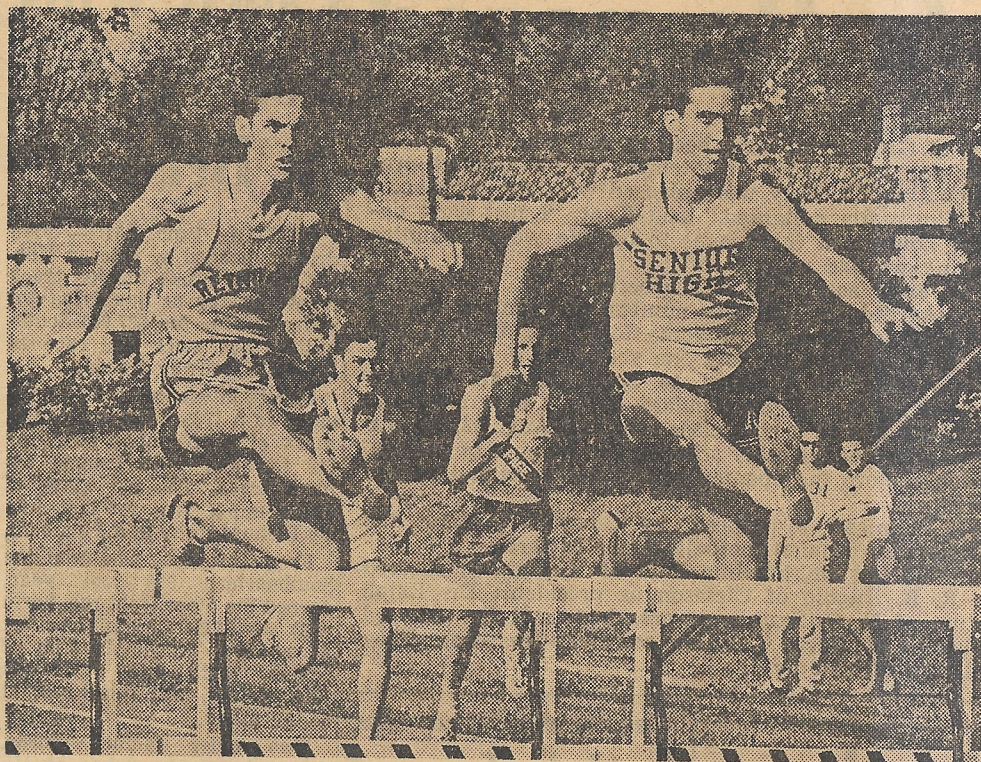
In the mile relay, the record is 3:34.1. Greensboro Page is the top entry with 3:38.7.

# Burlington Gambles, Nips Reynolds, 39-36½, in 4-A

Because Coach Kerry Richards took a chance, Burlington Williams won the Class 4-A Central Conference track championship yesterday at Hanes Park.

Burlington's triumph was by only 2½ points (39-36½) over favored Winston-Salem Reynolds, which had claimed seven of the last eight titles. Greensboro Grimsley was third with 30 points.

Richards' gamble was in using Sam Fowler on the 880-yard relay team instead of Eddie Hicklin. He figured that the re-

lay team would be strong enough to win without Hicklin and that Hicklin would be fresher for the 440-yard dash which was the next event.

As it turned out, Burlington set conference records in both events. Hicklin's :52.2 broke by a tenth of a second the record for the 440 which Mickey Andrews of Grimsley set in 1963. The 880 relay team of Fowler, Carl Salters, Pete Burgess and Mike Garrison had a 1:34.1 timing, topping the record of 1:34.7 which Burlington established last year.

Garrison, a wisp of a youngster, ran the last 220-yard leg

of the relay. He was 10-15 yards behind Grimsley's Lenny Maynor when he took the baton, and he surged ahead of Maynor with 50 yards left.

Three other conference records were also bettered:

—In the 220-yard dash Garrison reeled off a :22.3 in a qualifying heat before noon. It eclipsed the standard of :22.8 which was set in 1932.

—In the 180-yard low hurdles Stuart Peters of Reynolds skimmed the obstacles in :20.5 during a morning qualifying heat. The record was :21.1.

—In the 880-yard run Bob Albright of Grimsley ran away from the field in posting a 2:01.3 time. The record of 2:03 was set in 1949.

Garrison, Hicklin and Peters were the only multiple winners. Garrison won the 100-yard dash, the 220 and was on the winning 880 relay team. Hicklin won the 440 and was on the winning mile relay team. Peters was first in the 180-yard low hurdles and the 120-yard high hurdles.

Individual scoring honors went to Peters who tied for second in the high jump and finished second in the broad jump in addition to his two victories. He had 15½ points.

Mike Julian of Salisbury ran the mile in 4:37—only one second shy of the record set in 1963 by Harry Boyte of Grimsley. It was the best non-record performance of the day.

# <sup>ay</sup>Foes' Surprises <sup>may</sup> Defeat Reynolds <sup>1</sup>

Bill Webster pulled the slightly crumpled and damp book of high school track rules from his back pocket yesterday at Hanes Park to check something on the pole vault.

He figured that the rule could make the difference between his team, Winston-Salem Reynolds, finishing in a tie or winning the Class 4-A Central Conference track championship.

But, before he could uncover the ruling, someone came by to tell him that Greensboro Page had won the high jump, not Reynolds as Webster had anticipated.

"We won't have to worry about the tie now," he told Coach Kerry Richards of Burlington Williams.

Instead of getting eight points in the high jump, Reynolds got only five. That would have been enough to win the title. Burlington came out on top with 39 points, Reynolds had 36½ and Greensboro Grimsley had 30.

David Ensley of Page was the culprit insofar as Reynolds was concerned. He and Reynolds' Turner Whitted and Stuart Peters battled for first place in the high jump. Ensley cleared 5-8 on his first jump, but the two Reynolds boys missed. Then all of them failed in three attempts at 5-9. Ensley got the victory because of fewer misses.

It was that kind of day for Reynolds. It wasn't so much that Burlington beat favored Reynolds as it was that the other six teams pulled off a few surprises.

And, on top of that, Webster said, "We were off just generally. If we had finished a little better here or there, we would have been all right."

Webster said beforehand that 35 points should win the meet, and he said that he figured Reynolds would get that many. He was correct in the latter but not the former instance.

Richards of Burlington said he figured the possible outcome every way possible, and the only score he could come up with was a 36-36 tie between his team and Reynolds. During the season Reynolds had beaten Burlington by 25 points in a triangular meet, but Reynolds' depth in the conference meet wasn't as strong.

The two individual stars of the meet were Reynolds' Stuart Peters and Burlington's Mike Garrison. Peters won both hurdles events, tied for second in the high jump and finished second in the broad jump. He set a record in the 180-yard low hurdles with :20.5.

Garrison won the 100-yard dash and 220-yard dash. He practically won the 880-yard relay by himself. When he took the baton for the final 220 yards, he was 10 yards behind Lenny Maynor of Grimsley. He made up the difference within 170 yards and won by about three strides. His time was estimated at 21 seconds.

Roland Barnhardt of Reynolds broad - jumped 20 feet 4½ inches and remained unbeaten in that event this season. He has six victories.
