

North Forsyth Is Favored In Conference Track Meet

North Forsyth, unbeaten in Forsyth 3-A competition, will be favored to defend its conference track title in the league meet at North Friday.

Five champions will be back to defend their titles and performances in at least six events should be better than last year, according to what the boys have done so far.

Hugh Hampton of West Forsyth will defend his high jump title but hasn't bettered his record of last year. Hampton won with a leap of 5 feet, 11 inches last year and has done 5-11 this year. Ray Warden of East Forsyth with a 5-10 is the top challenger.

Harvey Bauguess of North Forsyth is defending champion in both the high and low hurdles. Bauguess should better his low hurdles time of last year. He won the event in :21.2 last year and has done :20.9 this year. Terry Duggins of West Forsyth has done :21.3 and Bill Alexander of East Forsyth has a :22.

Bauguess Is Favorite

In the high hurdles, Bauguess won last year with a record-setting :15.3. The best he has done this year is :15.5. Johnny Stewart of West Forsyth has a :15.4 to be the favorite. Alexander of East has a :15.6.

Stewart of West will defend the broad jump championship, which he won last year with a jump of 20 feet, 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches. Stewart's best this year is 20 feet, 5 inches. Challengers include Warden of East Forsyth with 19 feet, 11 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches and Ronnie King of North Forsyth, who has done 18 feet, 10 inches.

Barry Quinn of West Forsyth will defend his 880 title. Quinn has done a 2:03.4. Francis Crosby of East has a 2:07. Richard Lavinder and Phillip Wood of North have done 2:09. Quinn's winning time last year was 2:10.4.

Doug Linville of East Forsyth is the favorite in the 100-yard dash with a best time of :10.5, but Bill Raisner of North Forsyth, whose best is :10.6, has beaten him. Warden of East (:10.6) and Hampton of West (:10.8) are other top contenders. The winning time last year was :10.4.

Linville is the 220-yard favorite with a best time of :23.5. Alexander and Jack Smith of East Forsyth are top contenders with :23.9. Duggins of West has a :23.9 and Steve Barrow of North has a :24. Winning time last year was :23.

David Beeson of East, with a 4:51, is the favorite in the mile. Jimmy Latchford of West has a 4:59. The winning time last year was 4:51.7, so Beeson could better this.

East is the favorite in the 880 relay with a 1:37, which is bet-

ter than North's winning time last year of 1:37.1.

North is the mile relay favorite with a 3:36.5, which betters last year's winning time of 3:40.4 by the Vikings.

Jack Hanley and Joe Crotts of North Forsyth are co-favorites in the shot with 43 feet. Winning throw last year was 46 feet, 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Bob Randall of East should better last year's winning discus throw. Randall has done 134 feet, and last year's winner did 129 feet, 7 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Orval Jones of North should better the pole vault of last year. He has done 11 feet, 6 inches. Last year's winning vault was 9 feet, 6 inches. Watson DuFour of North has done 11 feet. Tom Pegram and Ted Brown of East have done 10 feet.

Forsyth 3-A Track Meet Is Set Today

North Forsyth will be favored to retain its Class 3-A Forsyth Conference track championship in the conference meet today at North.

It is possible that five conference records will be erased today. Those records are in the 440-yard dash, the 880-yard run, the pole vault, mile relay and 180-yard low hurdles.

Rick Berrier of East Forsyth (1963) and Bill Wellman of West Forsyth (1964) hold the 440 record with :53.4. Bill Raisner of North Forsyth has done a :53.1.

Jimmy Wall of Northwest Forsyth (when it was a senior high school) holds the 880 record with a 2:07.1, set in 1963. Barry Quinn of West Forsyth has done a 2:03.4 and Frank Crosby of East has a 2:07.

Orval Jones of North Forsyth could break the pole vault record. He has done 11 feet, 6 inches and the record is 11 feet, 4 inches, held by Dwight Morris of Northwest.

North Forsyth's mile relay team has a 3:36.5 and could break Northwest's mile relay record of 3:46.6, set in 1962.

Harvey Bauguess of North Forsyth has tied his brother Milton's record of :20.9 in the low hurdles.

Harvey is the record holder in the high hurdles with a :15.3, set last year. His best time this year is a :15.5 and Johnny Stewart of West Forsyth has a :15.4.

The record in the 100 is :10.3, set by Mickey Austin of Mineral Springs in 1961 and matched by Eddie Pinson of Mineral Springs in 1962. Doug Linville of East Forsyth has a :10.5.

In the 220, Bob Maddy of Hanes is the record holder with a :22.4, set in 1962. Linville of East has the best time, :23.5.

Paul Snell of Northwest Forsyth has the mile record, with a 4:39.3, set in 1962. David Beeson of East Forsyth has the best time, 4:51.

North Forsyth has the 880 relay record, with a 1:36.1, set last year. East is the top challenger with a 1:37.

David Wallace of Mineral Springs holds the broad jump record with a 20 feet, 9½ inches, set in 1963. Stewart of West Forsyth is the leading broad jumper with 20 feet, 5 inches.

Hugh Hampton of West Forsyth holds the high jump record with a leap of 5 feet, 11¾ inches last year. He's the favorite again and has done 5-11 this year.

John Fagg of Hanes holds both the shot and discus records and both appear safe. Fagg's shot put mark is 51 feet, 1½ inches. Jack Hanley and Joe Crofts of North Forsyth are top contenders with 43 feet. Fagg's discus record is 148 feet, 7 inches, set in 1963. Bob Randall of East Forsyth has the best discus throw with 134 feet.

North Forsyth Nips East In Record-Breaking Meet

North Forsyth won the mile relay in record time (3:36) to edge East Forsyth, 58-53, for the Forsyth 3-A track championship in the conference meet at North yesterday. West Forsyth finished third with 37 points.

Six conference records fell as the Forsyth 3-A held its final track meet. The schools will move into the Central 4-A next year.

Johnny Stewart of West Forsyth broke the 440 record with a time of :52.5. The old mark was :53.4, held jointly by Bill Wellman of Southwest Forsyth (1964) and Rick Berrier of East Forsyth (1963).

Barry Quinn of West Forsyth smashed the 880 mark with a 2:06. The record was 2:07.1, set by Jimmy Wall of Northwest Forsyth in 1963.

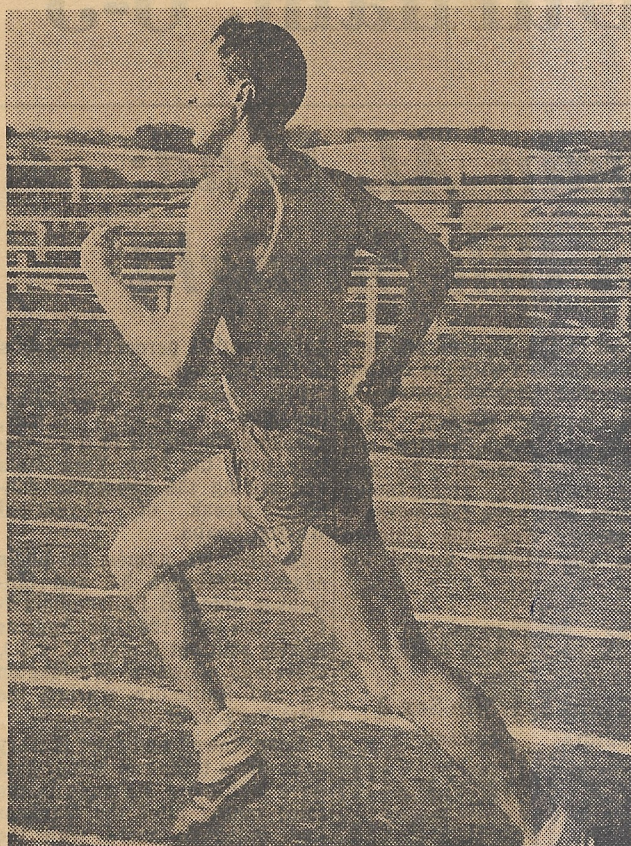
Ray Warden of East Forsyth set a broad jump record with a leap of 20 feet, 10 inches. The old record was 20 feet, 9½ inches, set by David Wallace of Mineral Springs in 1963.

Orval Jones of North Forsyth broke the pole vault mark, going 11 feet, 6 inches. The old record was 11 feet, 4 inches, held by Dwight Morris of Northwest Forsyth (1963).

East Forsyth's 880 relay team set a record, winning the event in 1:36. The old record was 1:36.1, set by North last year.

Members of the winning East team were: Doug Linville, Albert Thompson, Jack Albert and Bill Alexander.

North Forsyth cracked its mile relay record, with a time

of 3:36. The old record, set by North last year, was 3:40.4. Members of the winning North team were: Steve Barrow, Butch Westmoreland, Larry Haynes and Bill Raisner.

North and East battled neck-and-neck all the way. North swept the shot with Jack Hanley taking first, Joe Crotts, second; Jack Viet, third and Josh Jenkins, fourth.

North's Harvey Bauguess kept his low hurdles title with a time of :21. Jenkins won the discus for North with a toss of 121 feet, 10¼ inches. North took first and second in the pole vault with Jones first and Watson DuFour second.

East's Jack Albert won the 100 and the Eagles' David Beeson was first in the mile. Doug Linville of the Eagles won the 220.

East's Warden and West's Stewart were the only double winners. Warden won both the high jump (5-10) and the broad

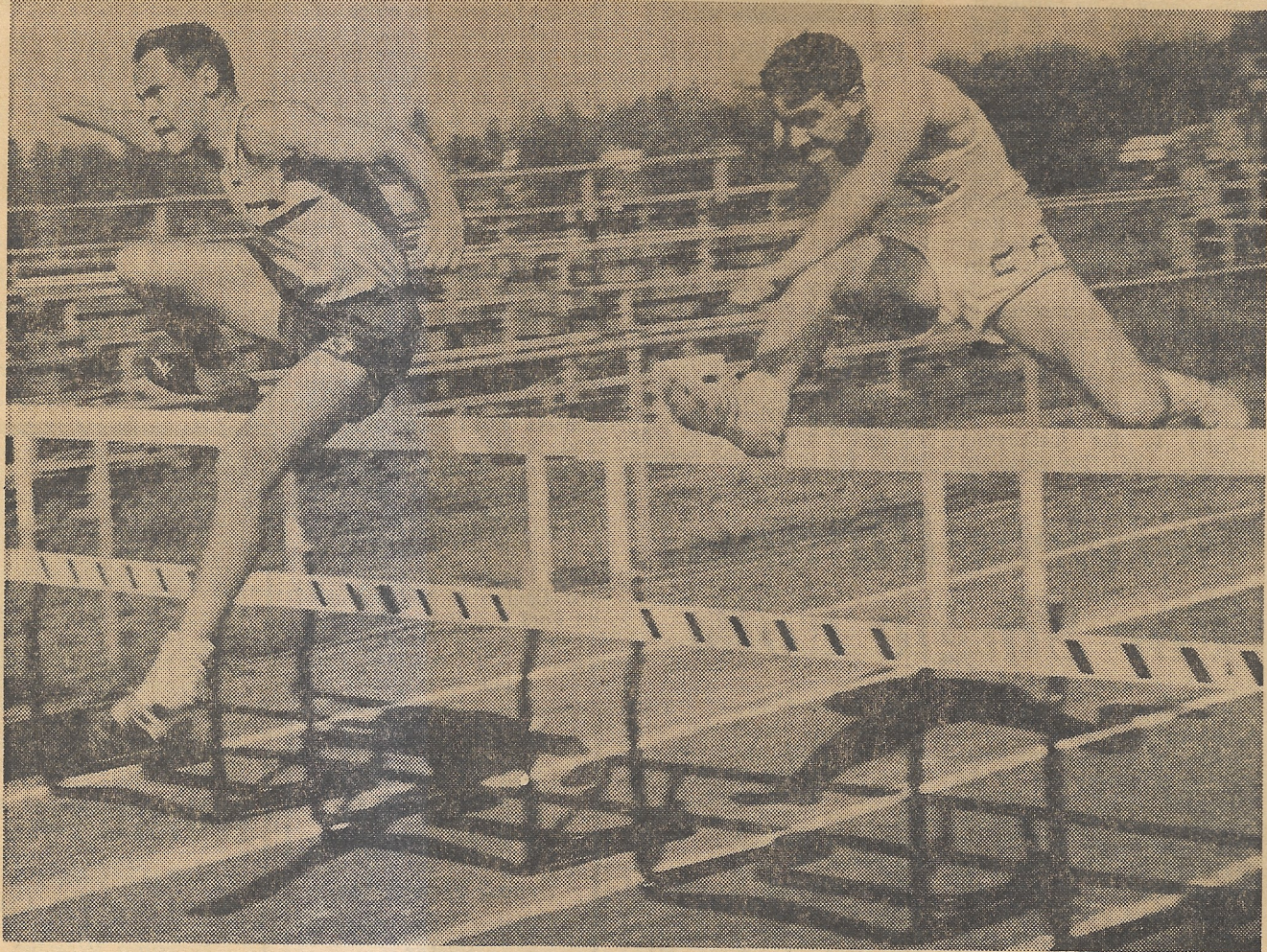

Lineup Switch Pays Off

North Forsyth will retire as undefeated track champion of the Forsyth 3-A Conference.

The Vikings edged East Forsyth, 58-53, yesterday with West Forsyth finishing third with 37 points. Griffith, the fourth conference member, did not enter.

The Forsyth 3-A will go out of existence next year as the teams move into the Central 4-A. The six records set yesterday will stand for all time.

North Forsyth Coach A. C. Larrimore gave credit to a lineup switch for the Vikings' victory. Larrimore put Harvey Bauguess in the 220 as a surprise entry. Bauguess qualified and knocked out an East Forsyth runner in doing so. He finished third in the finals to pick up two important points.

North was in good shape when East and North were tied 53-53 with only the mile relay to be run. The mile relay is a Viking specialty, but the North runners won it in record time of 3:36, just so there wouldn't be any doubt.

East's 880 relay team chopped one-tenth of a second off the record time, winning in 1:36. The Eagles lost to North and Reynolds earlier this year.

Barry Quinn, West Forsyth's veteran half-miler, smashed the 880 record (by Jimmy Wall of

2:07.1). Quinn, who said he was shooting for the mark, won in 2:06. It isn't his best time. He ran a 2:03 in the city-county meet.

"I'm looking forward to the sectionals next week at Wake Forest," said Quinn. "I'd really like to win that, but I'll get some stiff competition from Bob Albright (Greensboro Grimsley)."

Albright won the 880 in the Central 4-A meet in a time of 2:01.8 yesterday.

Ray Warden of East Forsyth started in the broad jump this year after being a specialist in the high jump. Ray won both events, taking the high jump with a 5-10 and the broad jump with 20 feet, 10 inches. He set his record in the broad jump. The old mark was 20 feet, 9½ inches and had been held by David Wallace of Mineral Springs.

Hugh Hampton, the defending champion in the high jump, was late reporting to his event and wasn't permitted to jump.

Johnny Stewart of West Forsyth also was a double-winner and record-setter. Stewart won the high hurdles in :15.5. He won the 440 in a record time of :52.5. The old mark was :53.4.

The 440 is a new event for Stewart.

"I've only run it a couple of times," he said. "We don't have

much depth at West, so everyone has to pitch in on some extra events. I tried the 440 and it has worked out. I haven't lost either time I've run it."

Stewart has done a :15.4 in the high hurdles, which he considers his best (and favorite) event.

He plans to go to Wake Forest next fall.

Orval Jones of North Forsyth smashed the pole-vault record with a vault of 11 feet, 6 inches. Dwight Morris of Northwest had the record with 11 feet, 4 inches.

The pole vault is a new skill for Orval, too. A friend of his got him interested.

"I started working with an old cane pole," said Orval. "I worked on it all summer and

most of the fall. I have another year in school and I'm really going to concentrate on it now."

At the start of the season, the best the young North vaulter could do was 10 feet.
