Reynolds Sweeps Meet From Grimsley and Gray

Stuart Peters, Reynolds High School's versatile track man, won three firsts and a second as Reynolds opened its track season with a victory over Greensboro Grimsley and Gray.

The meet score was Reynolds 85, Grimsley 59 and Gray 4.

Peters won first in the high hurdles with a time of :15.4, in the low hurdles with a :20.9, in the high jump with 5 feet, 6 inches and was second in the broad jump.

Steve Swearingen of Reynolds

had two firsts, in the 100 (:10.4) and the 220 (:23).

Reynolds finished one, two, three in the mile. Ron Clitherow was first with a time of 4:52.7. Randy Phillips was second and Silas Wild third.

George Morgan of Reynolds won the 440 in :55.5.

Reynolds' strength in the sprints was something of a surprise because Grimsley is usually strong in these events.

Johnny Johnson of Reynolds won the discus with a toss of 129 feet, 3¾ inches.

Roland Barnhardt won the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet, 4 inches.

Gray did not enter all events as the Hounds did not have a full team.

Rodney Anderson of Gray was second in the shot and Steve Richardson was fourth in the 440 for Gray's only points.

Bob Hayes to Compete In Professional Race

SYDNEY, Australia — Bob Hayes, the world's fastest human, was in good form yesterday and thinks he will make \$500 Saturday in a little less than 10 seconds, by winning a 100-yard sprint against four Australian runners.

The American winner of the

100-meter dash in last October's Tokyo Olympics is in Sydney to compete in his first professional foot race. It may be his last, since he is leaving Monday to return to the United States to become a professional football player with the Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League.

The Hayes opponents today will be three Australian rugby players, Mike Cleary, Nick Yackich and Bill Sutton, and a professional sprinter, Terry Clarke. The five men will run on a special track between dog races at the Wentworth Park Greyhound Race Arena.

The winner of the competition will get \$500, the second man \$300, the third \$200, the fourth \$100 and the fifth \$50. There will be no regular betting on the race but Hayes's opponents are, of course, long shots.

Hayes has inspected the grass track at Wentworth Park and has declared it good enough for fast time. He says he has clocked 0:09.4 and 0:09.3 in two practice 100-yard dashes in the last week before his arrival in Australia Thursday.

Tomorrow's race is expected to draw above normal attendance for a Saturday-night turnout for the greyhounds. Foot-racing for money is an old tradition in Australia, where men usually run against each other but have been known to race against horses as well.

Stuart Peters Has Big Day in Track

Reynolds and North Forsyth opened their track seasons with victories yesterday.

Reynolds defeated Greensboro Grimsley and Gray in a triangular meet. The Demons scored 85 points to 59 for Grimsley and 4 for Gray.

North was scheduled to have a triangular meet but Griffith, which has only a few boys out for track, dropped out. So North and East battled it out with North winning, 61-57. The mile relay, last event on the program, decided the meet.

Stuart Peters of Reynolds was a one-man track team for the Demons. Peters, a slender senior who has a hard time deciding which is his favorite event, entered four and won three of them. He finished second in the other.

Peters won the high hurdles with a time of :15.4, the low hurdles in :20.9, the high jump with 5 feet, 6 inches and was second in the broad jump with 18 feet, 6½ inches.

"This really was one of my best days," said Stuart with a big smile. "If I had to pick a favorite event, I guess it would be the high hurdles. But I really like them all."

Stuart not only won these events but had his best showing in some of them. His time in the high hurdles matched his best of last season. His time in the low hurdles was the best he's done. He has high jumped 5-10 and broad jumped 19 feet, 4 inches.

Strong in Dashes

Reynolds was stronger in the dashes than had been expected. Steve Swearingen won both the 100 and the 220 with good times in both. He had a :10.4 in the 100 and a :23 in the 220. George Morgan won the 440 for Reynolds.

Reynolds should be strong in the mile this year as the Demons swept the event. Ron Clitherow was first, Randy Phillips second and Silas Wild third. The winning time (4:52.7) wasn't bad for a cold day and so early in the season. The milers should be able to cut it.

Johnny Johnson won the discus with a toss of 129 feet, 3¾ inches, and the big Reynolds end should do a lot better before the season ends.

Roland Barnhardt had a fine 20 feet, 4 inches in the broad jump and may do some record-breaking before the season is over.
