Stewart, Duggins, Peters Lead Local Entries

Winston-Salem will have 11 individuals and two relay teams in the state high school track meet to be held at Raleigh Friday.

Johnny Stewart of West Forsyth will be the busiest fellow. Stewart qualified for three events: the 440 dash, the high hurdles and the broad jump.

Stewart is a senior at West and this is his third year on the track (his first two seasons were at Southwest Forsyth). He plays a split end in football and played baseball a year until he hurt his shoulder which caused him to switch to track.

Conference Champion

He's Forsyth 3-A champion and record holder in the 440, an event he just started this spring. He's also conference champion in the high hurdles.

Terry Duggins, a long-legged team-mate, qualified in two events, the low and the high hurdles. Duggins is 6-4 and looks like a basketball player than a track man. He's a junior, ran the high hurdles last year and this is his first season with the lows. He won the lows in the sectionals with a time of :21.

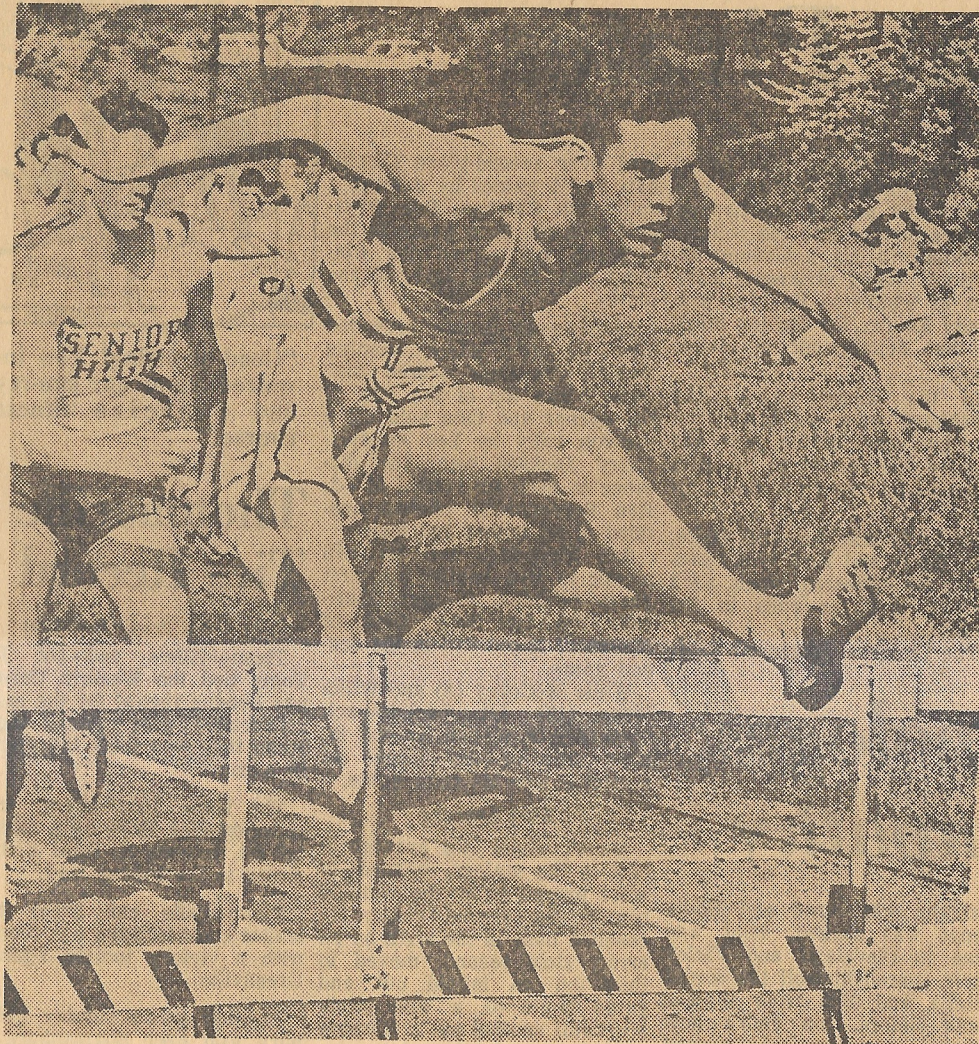
Stuart Peters of Reynolds is the only Winston-Salem boy to qualify in two events. Peters might have made it in more, but he was hampered by an injury which slowed him down in the high jump and broad jump, two of his better events. He won the high hurdles in :15.5 and was second in the low hurdles.

Coach Bill Webster of Reynolds thinks Stuart's chances in the highs and lows are about the same.

He won both the high and low hurdles in the Central 4-A meet.

Reynolds will have five boys competing in single events.

more. Clitherow qualified for the mile last year but didn't place in the state meet. He was second in this year's sectional.

Roland Barnhardt finished second in the broad jump in the sectionals to qualify. Barnhardt is the Central 4-A broad jump champion. He's a senior at Reynolds.

Blake Goslen finished third in the discus. Goslen, a Reynolds senior and football player, has come along well in the discus in the last few weeks.

Barry Quinn of West Forsyth gets one more chance to beat Greensboro Grimsley's fine half-miler, Bob Albright. The two boys, both strong in the 880, have been battling each other for the past couple of years with Albright holding a slim edge. Last year and this year in the sectionals Albright and Quinn finished one-two in the 880. Albright is Central 4-A champion and Quinn is Forsyth 3-A king.

Quinn is a football player and wrestler at West Forsyth.

Orval Jones of North Forsyth is a newcomer to the state meet. Jones just started pole vaulting this year. He won the Forsyth 3-A title and finished second in the sectionals with a vault of 11 feet, 6 inches. He's a junior at North.

Bob Randall of East Forsyth qualified in the discus by taking second in the sectionals. Randall, who is a fine pass catching end in the football season and a forward in basketball, is making his first trip to the state.

East Forsyth's mile relay team won the sectionals with a time of 3:35.2. North Forsyth, champions of the Forsyth 3-A Conference, was second.

Mt. Airy Dynamo Set for Title Bid

MOUNT AIRY — An old adage says that good things come in little packages, and it fits Billy Taylor, Mount Airy High School's track sensation.

Taylor doesn't look big — he's 5-8, 160 pounds — until he puts on his track uniform. Then he seems awesomely big to opponents, especially when he's soaring over the high jump bar at six feet, or broad jumping across 21 feet of sawdust.

Taylor, a redheaded dynamo with more bounce to the ounce than most high school juniors, will be in action when the 1965 state high school meet is held Friday at Raleigh.

He will be competing in the broad jump and the high jump, the two events in which he excelled at the Central Sectional Track Meet at Wake Forest May 8. At the

sectional, he won the broad jump with a jump of 20-11¾, and placed third in the high jump with a leap of nearly six feet.

He has done better in both events. At the District 5 meet last month he set records in both events by high jumping 6-¼ and broad jumping 21-10.

His performances at the district meet were even more spectacular in view of the fact that he participated in two other events there — the 100- and 220-yard dashes. He won the 100 with a time of 10.3 seconds (a District 5 record) and placed second in the 220 at 23.6.

When all the results were in at the district meet, Taylor had scored 19 of a possible 20 points and set three records. That's quite a day's work for a little man, but then, he doesn't look so little in that track outfit.

Four Champions to Defend Titles in Prep Track Meet

Four individual champions will try to defend their titles in the state high school track meet at Raleigh Friday.

George Soule of Charlotte Myers Park returns in the 100-yard dash; Truett Goodwin of Durham is back in the mile run; Hal Lilly of New Bern will defend his pole vault crown; and Clem Williams of Milbrook returns in the broad jump.

Raleigh Broughton's 880 relay team also will defend its title.

Soule won the 100 in 9.9 seconds last year and qualified for the state meet with a 9.95. Keith Nash of Hamlet, who finished third last year, is also back.

Jack Roten of Boone, who won the Winston-Salem sectionals in 10.3, will be a top contender.

Goodwin Is Mile Champ

Goodwin won the mile last year in 4:28.9 and won his sectionals this year in 4:29.3. Richard Lee of Wake Forest, who was third last year, also will compete. Randy Phillips of Reynolds, with a 4:37.1, was the local sectional winner.

Lilly vaulted 13 feet last year. He won his sectional title again this year, but his vaulting height wasn't listed in the meet report. Clay Rumble of Greensboro Page was the local sectional winner with 11 feet, 6 inches.

Williams broad-jumped 22 feet, 5 inches last year, but did only 20 feet, 14½ inches in winning the sectional title. Greg Cox of East Mecklenburg, who tied for second last year, is back. Billy Taylor of Mount Airy, with a jump of 20 feet, 11¼ inches, is the sectional champion.

Bruce Rafferty of Jacksonville is the favorite in the 220

with a qualifying time of :22.1. Last year's winner was Carroll Maxwell of Hendersonville in the record-setting time of :21.4. Mike Garrison of Burlington Williams is the local sectional champion with a :22.5.

Rafferty and Charles Keith of South Mecklenburg return in the 440, with Rafferty as the favorite. The Jacksonville

speedster had a :49.3 in the sectionals. This matches Maxwell's winning time last year.

Conrad Fletcher of Tabor City is the only place-winner back in the 880. Autry of Fayetteville had the best qualifying time with a 1:58.4.

Two Winston-Salem sectional runners, Bob Albright of Greensboro Grimsley and Bar-

ry Quinn of West Forsyth, could be top challengers. Albright is sectional champion with a 2:01.6.

There will be new champions in both the high and low hurdles. In the highs, Jeff Howser of Charlotte Myers Park led the qualifiers with a :14.6. Stuart Peters of Reynolds won the local sectionals in :15.5.

In the low hurdles, Howser is top qualifier with a 20:05. Terry Duggins of West Forsyth was the sectional winner with :21.

In the high jump, Wayne Wright of Greensboro Smith is the top qualifier with 6 feet, 2½ inches.

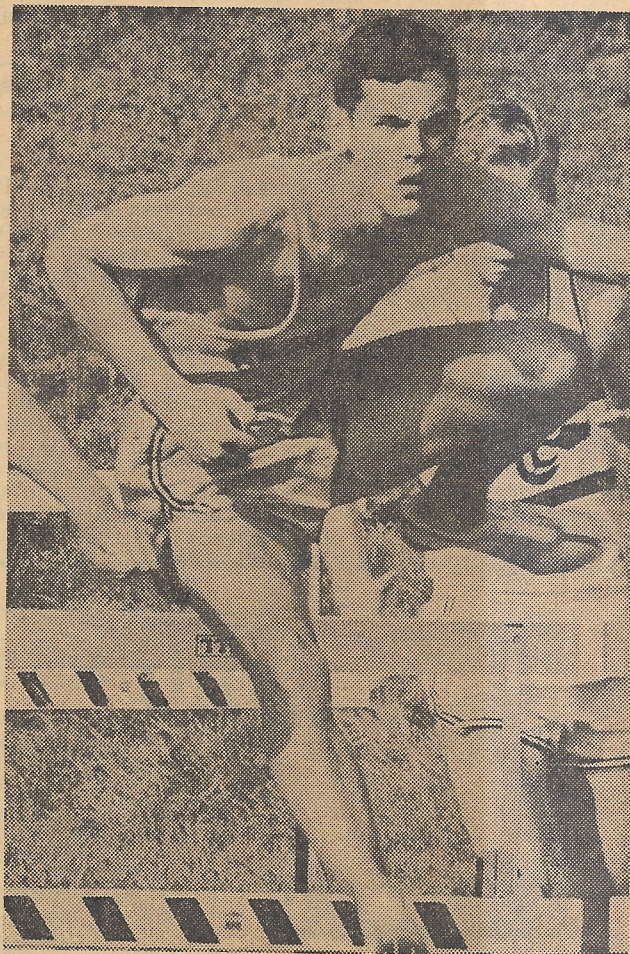
Rick Sloss Returns

In the shot, Rick Sloss of East Mecklenburg, who finished second last year, is back. The top qualifier is Tim Farmer of Chapel Hill with 56 feet, 10½ inches. John Thomas of North Davidson won the sectionals with 51 feet, 3½ inches.

Farmer also leads the qualifying in the discus with a toss of 154 feet, 1½ inches. Tommy Wrenn of Siler City won the sectionals with 139 feet, 1¼ inches.

Raleigh's 880 relay team won the sectionals with 1:33.6, which is not as good as its winning time in the state meet last year of 1:31.1. Top qualifier is Charlotte Myers Park with 1:30. Burlington Williams is the sectional winner with 1:33.8.

Myers Park leads the mile relay qualifiers with 3:27.6. East Forsyth is the sectional winner with 3:35.2.

Forsyth Trackmen Set to Challenge State Prep Stars Today at Raleigh ^{May} 21

RALEIGH — Charlotte Myers Park, perennially a track power in North Carolina, will be the favorite when the state high school track meet gets under way here this afternoon.

The team-to-beat label was awarded to Myers Park because the Mustangs scored more points at their sectional meet than any of the six other sectional winners compiled at their respective meets. Myers Park, the defending state champion, won the Charlotte Sectional with 62 points.

Winston - Salem Reynolds, which won the Central Sectional, scored the least points of any sectional champion. Reynolds edged Burlington Williams, 24-23, in the Central meet at Wake Forest May 8.

However, Coach Bill Webster's Demons are expected to finish near the top today.

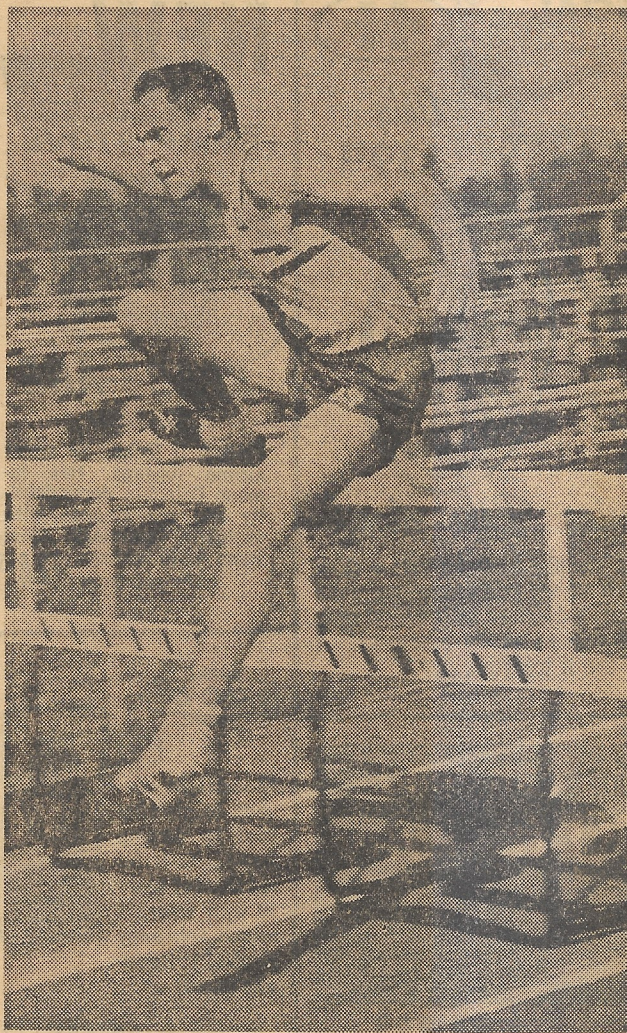
Reynolds will be represented by six men. They are Randy Phillips and Ron Clitherow, mile run; Stuart Peters, low and high hurdles; David Beavers, 880-yard run; Roland Barnhardt, broad jump; Blake Goslen, discus.

John Stewart of West Forsyth will be one of the busiest competitors. Stewart qualified at the sectional in three events—the 440-yard dash, the broad jump and the high hurdles.

West Forsyth will also be represented by Terry Duggins in the low and high hurdles, and by Barry Quinn in the 880.

Both the 880-yard and mile relay teams from East Forsyth will run. The Eagles' superb mile relay team of Jack Smith, Bill Alexander, Francis Crosby and Doug Linville won the event at the sectional in 3:35.2. They upset North Forsyth's mile relay foursome, which will be out for revenge at the state.

Bob Randall of East Forsyth will be among the discus en-

tries, while North Forsyth's Orvall Jones will enter the pole vault.

Judging from the results of the six sectional meets, five state records may fall. They include the high hurdles, shot

put, high jump, and both the 880 and mile relay events.

Besides Myers Park and Reynolds, other sectional winners include Hendersonville, Fayetteville, Jacksonville, and Raleigh Broughton.
