E. Forsyth Relay Time Tops Mark

East Forsyth's mile relay team may have a national Junior Olympic record, according to Dan Hackney, meet director. The time of 3:22.5 recorded at the meet here Friday is better than the listed national time of 3:24, held by the Southern Pacific team.

Hackney said the time would be submitted for a national mark.

The top performers will advance to the regional meet to be held in Charlotte on July

20.
