

Henry, Terps Win Cross Country Title

George Henry beat out two of his teammates and won the Atlantic Coast Conference cross country championship at Wake Forest yesterday. Henry, a junior from Elkton, Va., had a time of 22 minutes, 19.3 seconds over the 4.3-mile course.

Dave Starnes, a Maryland sophomore from Hendersonville, was second in 22:26 and John Amoss, a Maryland sophomore from Fallston, Md. was third in 22:33. The Terps won seven of the 12 top places.

Maryland had 25 points in winning the team championship for the second straight time. The closest rival was Duke with 62 points. North Carolina was third with 87. Virginia was fourth with 115. Wake Forest was fifth with 117. South Carolina was sixth with 123 and North Carolina State, seventh, with 198. Clemson entered four men (a team was seven) and did not score.

Paul Rogers, a sophomore from Duke, was the highest non-Maryland finisher. Rogers was fourth with a time of 22:47. Jim Meade of North Carolina was fifth with a time of 22:48.

John Hodsdon was Wake Forest's top finisher in eighth place with a time of 23:01. Maryland runners took the next four places.

Bob Crombie of South Carolina, last year's winner, was 30th. Crombie has been hampered by illness.

Mel Woodcock of N. C. State, who was given an outside chance, twisted an ankle and didn't finish.

Steve Middleton of Winston-Salem, running for N. C. State, finished 41st.

Other Wake Forest finishers included: Jim Hope, who was 26th; Joe Langford, who was 30th; Paul Davitt, who was 33rd, Grainger Ancarrow, who was 35th and Doug Pelton, who was 38th.
