HIGH SCHOOL MEN'S ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Greg Yeldell

The question presented in our Prep Preview back in the April issue was this on the men's side: "Are there any superstars out there?"

We said not yet, but predicted that someone would emerge. According to the triple jump prowess he displayed during the year, Greg Yeldell (North Rowan, Spencer, North Carolina) answered in the affirmative.

But Yeldell didn't just answer the question—he did so emphatically, breaking the 9-year-old High School Record with a jump of 53-11^{1/4} to garner bronze at the World Junior Champs.

Yeldell's international medal was impressive enough, but he was downright awesome

Yeldell Near Perfect

Greg Yeldell came very close to racking up a perfect score in AOY balloting, capturing 22 of 24 votes for No. 1. The other two went to miler Jon Stevens, whose all-around support didn't match those votes and ended up 4th.

Note that the 2–3 placers, Cooper and Mitchell, will be back next year.

on U.S. soil. Despite missing all of March with an ankle injury, Yeldell finished the season dominating his event like few others have. Domestically, he was undefeated, had the year's 8 longest jumps (and 9 of 10), with his best effort measuring a whopping 28 inches better than the next mark. Add to that 15 jumps over 51-feet and a No. 2 ranking in the long jump and it's easy to see why he was an almost unanimous choice as Athlete Of The Year.

He was the only male athlete to score the big-meet triple, winning the Golden West, National Scholastic and USATF Junior titles.

"I only jumped in 4 meets before [Golden West], but I just knew that things were going to go well for me," says Yeldell. "I put a lot more time into it this year and coach [Robert] Steele definitely had confidence in me jumping well."

Indeed, if there is a high school jumps coach who knows when to have confidence in a triple jumper, it would be Steele. From a school in central North Carolina with an enrollment of just 600, Steele has now produced four 50-plus jumpers.


Says the coach, "Greg is a great competitor with a lot of ambition. When he came in as a freshman in '94, he saw the All-American plaque of Brian Ellis [52-10^{3/4} in '91] and set a goal for himself to be better than that. And he's not just a great athlete, he's a very caring person. I believe he spent as much time with the kids in our local AAU group this summer as he did training himself."

When asked what it was that made his latest prodigy successful, Steele suggests, "I hope it's the same thing that makes our whole program special—we care an awful lot about the kids, ask that they work hard and that they set high goals. Greg has certainly done that."

Yeldell, too, credits the program for his success, saying that the tutelage of Steele made him "feel like I could be the best. He's been like a father to me."

of Indiana U coaching legend Sam Bell may not be easy for his replacement, Marshall Goss. However, if the longtime Hoosier assistant continues to attract recruits such as Yeldell, he may soon create a growing presence of his own.

Goss has begun the new Indiana era with a straightforward goal of finding the "best quality student-athletes that we can find."

With the image of the elite athlete appearing to be more and more that of untouchable prima donna, Goss says that he's found something of an anomaly in Yeldell: "So many guys with his type of talent and accomplishments come across as uncoachable. I don't see that in Greg. He's come in here and has carried through on everything that we've asked him to do. I truly believe that he wants to be one of the very best and will do what it takes to get there."

For the time being, however, Goss will have to wait until after football season to see the results of his recruiting. That's because this fall, Yeldell is starting on special teams and playing backup strong safety.

Says Goss, "The football staff has told me that he's our best freshman right now. I guess he's doing everything that they're asking of him, too."
